- The Leadership Development team was formed three years ago and assists the Nominating Committee in finding future leaders.
- For the second year a member is participating in Leadership Morgan Hill. A leadership workshop was held. Members are encouraged to attend state leadership training.
- Branch retreats are held yearly. Tonight is the first mini retreat.
- Members have served on state committees. Members will attend the National Convention.
 - Committee chairs are encouraged to use the results of the interest survey as a resource for finding committee members.

Programs - Margaret McCann, Janet McElroy

- Tech Trek girls and scholarship recipients are invited to brunches to remind members and potential members why we exist.

Call to Order/Announcements - Co-president Jenny Redfern called the meeting to order at 7:23 pm.

Minutes - The minutes of March 5, 2015 were approved as submitted.

Financial Report

- CFO Peggy Martin reviewed the financial report dated April 5, 2015. The report was accepted.
- Peggy noted most deposits were for WFR. The only payment was to Hillview for the newsletter.
- A new invoicing system will send notice via email with a link to renew membership.
 - Peggy will find out whether the old system can still be used and will also request that an invoice be sent to one member as a test.

Membership Report

 Maggie Leininger reported 157 members plus three new members to be added to the database.

Programs

- Janet McElroy said the Women in Politics program on April 23rd at 6:00 pm in the El Toro Room, CCC, will feature a panel of three with a moderator. Laptops will be available for membership renewals and voting for state candidates and issues. Carol O'Hare explained that CA Perspective will have information about state election; Outlook will discuss national election, the biggest issue being whether to stop requiring college degrees for AAUW membership. Jenny encouraged members to use the links on the agenda to learn more about both state and national elections.
- Margaret McCann reported a decision is being made about use of extra funds from the showing of "Girl Rising".
- Carol O'Hare reported good attendance by AAUW members at Silicon Valley Reads.

Committee Reports

Wildflower Run

- Elizabeth Mandel highlighted key points in her report (attached): 1166 runners participated, with registration fees totaling approximately \$33,000. With sponsor and other donations, the total was approximately \$64,000, or an estimated \$45-50,000 after expenses.
- Elizabeth expressed appreciation to Tasha Standridge for providing great visibility on Facebook. She passed around the latest issue of Out and About which shows the WFR was voted Readers' Choice favorite run.
- Susan Oldham-Fritts reported 31 youth volunteers assisted with WFR.
- Elizabeth mentioned the possibility of adding a 2K run for participants 75 and older. Carol noted a 90-year-old woman won second place in the 5K run.

Elizabeth said new runners submitted most of the feedback forms. She requested
member feedback prior to the wrap-up meeting on April 13. She noted Easter will be
early in 2016, and she suggested the WFR be held later. She will check dates of
school vacations.

Wildflower Run Sponsors -

- Barbara stated she has received all checks from sponsors, for a total of \$23,700. She thanked dedicated committee members and suggested it would be helpful to have three more members on the committee.
- Orchids have been ordered for sponsors who gave \$500 and up; wine will also be given for sponsors who gave \$1,000 or more. A photograph of his or her booth and a thank you note will be sent to every sponsor.

AAUW Funds/Member Donations

 Carol reported a record number of member donations to WFR: \$7,005, plus \$570 from friends and relatives; 51.6% member participation; 100% Board participation; and 96% WFR committee participation.

GEMS

- Susan said State AAUW would like to have a Branch STEM Chair for youth outreach. This could perhaps be combined with the GEMS coordinator position.
 - o Tabled to the May meeting.
- Five GEMS girls interviewed and shadowed women STEM professionals as part of a documentary film about women engineers.
- Jenny suggested showing the film and having the girls speak at one of our programs.

Leadership

 Joan Ensign indicated that Carol will distribute handouts from Leadership Day in Hayward at the next LDT meeting.

Social Media

- Tasha Standridge reported the branch Facebook page, which is set up as an individual
 account, is going well. There was discussion about who could take over the Facebook
 page when Tasha moves out of the area.
- Carol noted Tasha is hosting Wine and Whine in April.
 - o Elizabeth will send a list of members who might be able to manage Facebook.

New Business

Proposal: writing contest

- Janet reported that Marty Cheek, Morgan Hill Life, would like to have a monthly youth feature in the paper.
- Margaret said the contest, for grades 7 through 10, will be publicized in local schools by April 16. Students who apply would attend a journalism workshop on May 23 and submit an essay by June 12. Branch members would assist with editing. The winner of the contest will receive \$100 from Booksmart. Carol noted there was in the past a Women's History Month essay contest for elementary students.
- o Susan will add the contest to GEMS opportunities.
- o Carol suggested the youth feature should mention AAUW.

It was moved and seconded (McElroy/Dicker) that AAUW MH sponsor a monthly youth column in Morgan Hill Life, written by local girls in grades 7 through 10, including all schools in Morgan Hill and/or MHUSD. Passed unanimously.

Other Business

Jenny reported seven members attended Leadership Day in Hayward and found the workshops helpful. Susan mentioned one point made was that, given a choice between retaining a member and getting a job done, it is more important to retain the member.

National Convention
