The branch has approved allocation of a record \$51,000 from our Wildflower Fund. This money consists of 2017 run proceeds, corporate sponsorships, and individual donations. Allocations include an impressive array of local scholarships, community action grants in support of local non-profit organizations, Stanford Tech Trek camperships for middle school girls, GEMS, and Speech Trek. 
