VOTE "YES" JANUARY 9-11, 2018

The September 2017 all-member vote to return AAUW CA to a public benefit corporation failed because of 26 (1%) "no" votes, including one from Morgan Hill Branch. Although 99% of votes were "Yes", that was not enough because California's regulations <u>require a UNANIMOUS "Yes" vote</u> to change the status of a corporation.

If you do not understand the issue, please do not vote "no" because it will have serious and costly consequences. It is critical to the future of AAUW CA that all votes are "Yes."

In October branch members attended the AAUW Fund luncheons that featured some of the 19 fellowship and grant recipients studying in Northern California. These women may be doing post graduate research, changing a career, or working on a community project, all supported by donations to the AAUW Fund.

- A fellow at Stanford is studying society in Baghdad to learn why there was such strife and discord after the removal of Suddam Hussein.
- Another is looking at the effects of the environment on health, such as why there are so
 many preterm births linked to low income.
- The Girl Scouts of America is offering STEM programs, such a badge in robotics, with the help of a Community Action Grant.
- A PhD neuroscience student at Berkeley is studying stress and the brain to determine why women are more likely to develop anxiety and PTSD after a traumatic experience.
- A Career Development Grant recipient has returned to school to study to viticulture and enology at UC Davis.
- A self-called "energy nerd" is studying how people can be comfortable in buildings while using less energy.
- The recipient of the Morgan Hill Blaine Cate Endowment, Dr. Alani Hicks-Bartlett, is doing post doctorate work at Berkeley that addresses "perceived 'alterity,' gender, and dis/ability studies in the Early Modern period." She speaks nine languages!

These luncheon events are always inspiring and demonstrate what our donations to the AAUW Fund can do.

Congratulations to Kathy and Brian Sullivan on being named Woman and Man of the Year by the Morgan Hill Chamber of Commerce.

Kathy is a longtime member of our branch who has played major, leadership roles with the Wildflower Run. She also has served many years as president of the Morgan Hill Historical Society

Brian has been active in the Chamber and Rotary and regularly volunteers for community events, including, of course, the Wildflower Run.

LEGAL ADVOCACY FUND: UPDATE ON CASES

The AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund has adopted three new cases this past year and has continued to support its ongoing cases. In Rizo v Fresno County Office of Education, AAUW joined an amicus brief that supported Rizo's petition for a rehearing en banc (in front of all the judges of a court rather than a selected panel). The panel had previously held that using prior salary alone to calculate current wages can be permissible under the Equal Pay Act.

In Burhams v Yale, the plaintiff favorably settled her case. Burhams claimed that over the course of ten years, she tried repeatedly to notify Yale of potential Title IX violations resulting from the university's sexual assault complaint procedure. She claimed Yale retaliated against her and eventually terminated her position.

This year AAUW has adopted three cases. Two of them – Portz v St. Cloud State University and Robb v Lock Haven – involve female student athletes filing lawsuits alleging violations of Title IX. Both claim a failure on the part of the universities to provide proportionate opportunities for women and men athletes. They allege that women's teams are being cut and that despite interest from women students, the universities have not added any teams or elevated women's club teams to varsity.

PUBLIC POLICY: PLAYBOOK ON BEST PRACTICES: GENDER EQUITY IN TECH

AAUW, in partnership with Dell, has just released the "Playbook on Best Practices: Gender Equity in Tech." The report offers specific strategies and actions that have proven successful for recruiting, retaining, and advancing women in engineering and computing fields. These nclude promoting inclusive talent pipelines, fair recruiting strategies, and an unbiased work culture.

LOOKING TO DIVERSIFY YOUR STEM WORKFORCE? AAUW JUST WROTE THE PLAYBOOK.

The report gives examples of a number of successes. Carnegie Mellon University achieved gender equity in computer science in 2016 after a 15 year cultural makeover. They found that there was no need to

modify the curriculum. Cultural factors were more influential in integrating women so that they receive the same opportunities, visibility and networking as men. In 2015 Salesforce, a cloud computing company, performed a comprehensive analysis of 17,000 employees that led to salary adjustments for 6% of their employees and a 33% increase in the number of women who were promoted.

HOLIDAY GIVING PROJECTS



AAUW was one of the co-sponsors of BookSmart's Gift of Reading program that collected new books for underserved children. Members of AAUW and Friends of the Library sorted and boxed 688 books at Margaret McCann's and another 215 at BookSmart, for a total of 903 books that will help support literacy among local children.

Thanks to the generosity of branch members, especially one especially generous donor, \$1410 in gift cards was contributed for the immigrant women and children at the Learning and Loving Education Center. The

director Christa Hanson writes, "Thank you so much for your generous donation of gift cards. You have been so faithful to the Center for so many years. These will be such wonderful surprise gifts for some of our neediest families, who have no extra money to spend for the holidays. We are so grateful."

COMMUNITY ACTION GRANTS

Community Action Grants for 2017 have been awarded to seven organizations in Morgan Hill. Total allocations for the year were \$4,000, an increase from \$3,500 in 2016. Community Action Grants are awarded to local non-profit organizations for specific programming consistent with AAUW's mission and are funded through AAUW-MH's Wildflower Fund.

Recipients are:

- Community Closet, St. Catherine Parish of the St. Vincent de Paul Society, for backpacks, lunch bags and reusable water bottles for 75 preschoolers and kindergarteners starting school, \$875.
- Learning and Loving Education Center, Literacy for Immigrant Women writing program, start-up materials, printer materials and writing implements and teacher time, \$800.
- BookSmart Community Advantage Gift of Reading program, 64 books for underserved youth, \$500.
- Discovery Counseling Center, Bold Journey Elementary Program to develop healthy self esteem, communication and conflict resolution skills for kindergarten through sixth grade students, \$600.
- South Valley Science Fair at Oakwood School, monetary awards for winners in grades 6-12, \$300.
- Future Women's Leadership Conference, hosting 100 high school and community college students in April to build leadership skills, \$375.
- Yearbook Club at El Toro Health Science Academy, tablets for photography and yearbook design, \$600.


