




#### WILDFLOWER FUND ALLOCATIONS

#### Elizabeth Mandel, Chair

The branch has approved an allocation of a record \$65,000 from our Wildflower Fund. This money consists of 2019 run proceeds, corporate sponsorships, and individual donations. It is a reflection of the amazing commitment and hard work of our entire branch.

As usual, our allocations include an impressive array of local scholarships, community action grants in support of local non-profit organizations, STEM programming such as the Stanford Tech



Trek camperships for middle school girls, and leadership programming such as a Leadership Morgan Hill sponsorship, Speech Trek, and the Young Women's Leadership Conference. In addition, we continue to generously support AAUW nationally by sending money to the AAUW Fund.

This year, in addition to increasing allocations across all categories of funding, we made a major additional commitment to Community Action Grants---with an expressed focus on education programs. We also added a specific allocation of \$1,000 for the South Valley Science and Engineering Fair, increased our Reentry Scholarship funding (since we have expanded student eligibility for these scholarships), and significantly increased our branch contribution to AAUW nationally.

#### MORGAN HILL COMMUNITY FOUNDATION PHILANTHROPY AWARDS

On Friday, November 15, at their Annual Philanthropy Dinner, the Morgan Hill Community Foundation will publicly recognize our Branch Honoree, **Donna Dicker**, who has made a significant philanthropic/volunteer contribution to the AAUW Morgan Hill Branch.

Donna has done much for our Branch as described below. The photo at right shows Donna (seated) with President, Maggie Leininger, standing behind her at left, and Peggy Martin at right.

Donna and her husband moved to Morgan Hill in the summer of 1996. At the time she was teaching in the Santa Clara School District at Peterson middle school. She continued there until she retired in 2003. Donna joined AAUW through an invitation from Carol O'Hare after she had been attending the AAUW book group for several months.

Carol's invitation opened up the opportunity to meet many wonderful, talented women, to form lifelong friendships and to become a contributing member to the larger Morgan Hill community.

Donna's first job with AAUW was as an interest group chair. In this capacity, she Informed new members of the many groups that were available to them and signed them up if they were interested.

Donna was passionate about supporting women to continue their education and became a member of the high school scholarship committee. Eventually, she became

chair of the re-entry scholarship committee and in 2010 she got branch board approval to form **Keeping In Touch**, a grant program to continue giving financial assistance to former AAUW scholarship winners so they can pursue their education further. Donna also serves on the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) and Lauren Jenkins Healthcare Profession Scholarship committees. Finally, Donna became scholarship coordinator overseeing the four local scholarship programs.

Donna was also interested in Tech Trek, and for a number of years has served on the Tech Trek committee and annually helps select the girls who will attend the math and science camp each year at Stanford University.

For many years she acted as the chair of the Wildflower Run Goody Bag committee, and as Friendship chair she wrote a column for the Wildflower newsletter. She continues to communicate with members who have had a personal loss or illness. Last, but not least, in 2004 she paired up with Judy Kinker to become co-president.

Donna's greatest personal pleasure as an AAUW member has been to participate in the evening book group, the Mamas in the Kitchen cooking group, and the Writers Group. Although Donna's membership in the branch spans many years, she looks forward to

continuing to contribute to the goals of AAUW.

Congratulations to two other members of our branch who are also being honored this year at Philanthropy Night.



#### HOW I CAME TO LIVE IN MORGAN HILL



Our series on how various members of the AAUW Writers Group came to live in Morgan Hill continues with **Chris Hopwood**, who wrote her recollection in February 2017.

"One very good reason not to move to Morgan Hill was the commute to work in Sunnyvale. On the other hand, the housing prices were better than further up the peninsula so we couldn't rule it out entirely and kept looking at houses here.



In late 1988 the company my husband and I worked for in Florida lost its funding from the Japanese and my husband was let go. As his wife, they laid me off too, but I was hired back as a contractor and was able to work from wherever I happened to be. The gravitational pull of Silicon Valley to my husband, a computer scientist, was very strong. We had moved from Southern California to Florida in 1982, passing up the opportunities in Silicon Valley, and it seemed an omen that it was time to try Northern California. On the other hand, I was not keen. I had worked a lot with folks in Silicon Valley and found them rather an arrogant lot. Pennsylvania is where I really wanted to go. But computer jobs were hard to come by in Pennsylvania so Silicon Valley was the choice." Read more

Cheyun Lee, a recipient of the Morgan Hill Blaine-Cate Fellowship is pursuing her MBA at Santa Clara
University. She came from a traditional Korean family, entered into an arranged marriage and followed her husband to the United States. It took her seven years to recognize that she was in an abusive relationship. She escaped to a shelter with her daughter three years ago. She brought her daughter to the luncheon. She is interested in studying how abusive women struggle financially. She

speaks to several groups in the Bay Area of her experiences. In the above photo, from left to right, Peggy Martin, Janet Wright, Cheyun Lee, Judy Kinker, Carol O'Hare and Carol Holzgrafe.

**Jazmyne Gill** is pursuing a master's degree in biology at Sonoma State. She is a first-generation Hispanic college student. She was raised by a single mother and suffers from a chronic autoimmune disease. The scholarship is especially meaningful to her as she cannot work in addition to attending school because of her illness.

All of the women were very grateful for the assistance AAUW had provided in allowing them to pursue their studies.

#### AAUW YOUNG WOMEN LEADERS — CLIMATE RALLY

AAUW's Young Women Leaders joined young and not so young Morgan Hill residents, including a team of Specialized bicycle riders, in a rally protesting the lack of action from world leaders on the impending climate disaster. Millions of students around the world chose Friday, September 20<sup>th</sup>, the weekend before the United Nations was to meet in New York to discuss climate change, for their protests, strikes, and rallies. They were letting the world know that their future and the future of their children are being jeopardized if major changes are not implemented immediately. "This is not a fairy tale" they chimed "the Sky is Falling and we are sounding the alarm".

**Hassti Tirjardoon,** a junior at GECA, Gilroy Early College Academy, said the rally was to put a spotlight on the climate catastrophe. Hassti, along with other members of the Young Women Leaders, planned the Morgan Hill event that involved all schools in the Morgan Hill area. Specialized Bikes



joined in by supplying the PA system and stage, and Tanya Carothers and Tony Eulo, city of Morgan Hill environmental services department, set up tables and answered questions about what the city was doing to address the situation.

**Amirah Alexander**, a student from the Mt. Madonna High School, stated that she has always been passionate about the planet and this was a great opportunity to get involved with a project that could get the message out.
