Tessy Albin, branch treasurer presented the 2019–2020 annual budget of \$7750, which was accepted. For details go <u>here.</u>


# 37th WILDFLOWER RUN: March 29, 2020

These Fellowships are awarded to women pursuing a full-time course of study in programs where women's participation traditionally has been low. Selected Professions Fellowships are awarded for the following master's programs:



(1) Architecture (2) Computer/information sciences (3) Engineering (4) Mathematics/statistics

Fellowships in the following degree programs are restricted to women of color, who have been underrepresented in these fields: (1) Master's in business administration: applicants may apply for second year of study only (2) Law: applicants may apply for third year of study only (3) Doctorate in medicine: applicants may apply for third or fourth year of study only

Lee is an MBA student at Santa Clara University. She received a BFA at Ewha Woman's University in South Korea. She founded her own luxury dining decoration product brand there, *Tables and Figures*, in 2016.

She is also dedicated to helping the victims of domestic violence and child abuse victims. She is a public speaker to various community groups in the Bay Area on these issues. She aspires to help victims overcome financial difficulties through technology.

# TECH TREK: A Busy Week at Camp Curie

On July 7-12 eight campers stayed at Donner dormitory on the Stanford University campus while attending STEM classes, workshops and field trips. The girls shared their camp experiences in their letters.

After visiting the Virtual Human Interaction Lab in her Robotics class, **Rachel Fox** commented, "the virtual reality simulation was so realistic and super cool to experience." **Veronica Orozco** shared that "the best part about camp was getting to meet and interact with the girls." Many campers like **Jaci Bolton** had an opportunity to make a mini flashlight: "it was really fun to use a soldering iron and make a circuit work." Mad City Money was a fast-paced financial dramatization with campers given a career, salary, spouse, checks and debts while trying to keep their expenses under control. "I realized how much pressure adults are under to know how to budget and make sure they don't spend too much", **Roma Shah** commented. Star Night at the Stanford Observatory provoked comments such as "we saw the moon, Jupiter, Saturn and star constellations" from **Stella Gaudy**. **Samantha Pelts** stated about Forensics class: "the things we did were typing blood, extracting DNA, learned how to fingerprint and also designed a murder story for the rest of the camp to solve. Many of the campers, like **Susan Kirchhoff**, commented on making friends, "I'm glad to have met these girls and have become friends with them...I like knowing more girls have similar interests." **Claire Tomasco** spoke of the eight women who visited: "one of the most memorable experiences was definitely Professional Women's



Night. There was a bioengineer, who was also a chemist, and I thought 'Wow!' I want to do something like that!"
