 for us.


We hope you all had a happy holiday season. Now we look forward to so much in 2019:

MEMBERSHIP UPDATE


Jenny Redfern, Membership VP


Volunteers are needed: five judges, two timers and two videographers. If you can help, contact Joanne.

LEGAL ADVOCACY FUND

- Zoe Spencer Ph.D. is suing Virginia State University (VSU), alleging wage discrimination and retaliation. Her case was dismissed, and she is appealing to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth District. Local AAUW members stood with her in support for oral arguments in the courtroom as pay inequity in academia remains an ongoing problem.
- AAUW signed onto an amicus brief challenging the Trump administration's contraception coverage rules in
 Massachusetts v Health and Human Services et al in the U.S. Court of Appeals. In October 2017, the administration authorized
 employers with religious or moral objections to contraception to block their employees and dependents from receiving health
 insurance coverage for contraceptive care by nullifying provisions of the Affordable Care Act that would guarantee such
 coverage. AAUW supports no-cost contraceptive coverage because it increases women's ability to participate and succeed in
 the workplace and helps women reach their aspirations in higher education.

PUBLIC POLICY: EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

AAUW's public policy advocates support for a strong system of high-quality public education and adequate and equitable funding for all students, including preschool.

The California Budget and Policy Center has released its latest child care and preschool fact sheet with the headline that, adjusted for inflation, state spending on early care and education (ECE) programs are "near pre-recession levels with [a] boost from one-time funding". However, funding for vital pieces of California's ECE system, like resource and referral agencies and local planning councils, have either not been restored or have not kept pace with inflation. Given that, the report seems less like a cause for celebration than evidence of the state's ongoing underinvestment in its youngest citizens.

Owners of a business rarely take vacations and at 65, Dennis had worked all his life. I wanted him to retire and get away from the stress of being a construction sub-contractor. We arranged to have employees manage the business, so that Dennis could semi-retire."
