

WOMEN WIN THE VOTE CENTENNIAL 2020

One hundred years ago on August 26, 1920, all women were finally granted equal voting rights when the 19th amendment to the US Constitution was ratified. The struggle to win this basic right began in 1848 at the first women's rights convention in Seneca Falls, NY. It took women years of working together ceaselessly at the local, state and national levels - campaigning, lobbying, making speeches, organizing parades and protests, picketing, and even going to jail - to convince those in power (men) to pass woman suffrage.



This is a year to commemorate what women have accomplished over the past century and to look forward to what remains to be achieved for equal rights. Centennial events begin with the **Women's March** on Saturday, January 18. It will start at San Jose City Hall at 11am. The **Morgan Hill Historical Society** will present a special conversation on March 7 that focuses on local women.

The theme for **Silicon Valley Reads 2020** is **"Women Making It Happen."** Julian Guthrie, author of *Alpha Girls: The Women Upstarts Who Took on Silicon Valley's Male Culture and Made the Deals of a Lifetime*, will speak at the MH Library on Saturday, March 28.

The AAUW CA Convention, "Remembering the Past, Rockin' the Future," takes place April 17-19 in Millbrae. The 4th annual Morgan Hill Women's Week will be August 24-28.

Happy New Year! Hope this finds you all well and rested from the holiday season.

In an effort to keep the membership informed, for the next several newsletters, I will be sharing issues we are discussing at

our board meetings.

In this issue, I'd like to address Gavilan College's new board policy which mandates that all scholarships that run through Gavilan's system be gender neutral. In past years, Gavilan has been a huge resource for us in finding scholarship applicants for our Re-Entry and Lauren Jenkins Scholarships. We supplied our scholarship info and they matched us to potential applicants. With the passing of the new BP we are no longer able to use Gavilan's process since we offer scholarships only to women and girls. We are now researching other avenues, both online and in our community, to post our scholarship information.

Given this change in Gavilan's policy, the hot topic at our December board meeting was whether or not we should change to gender-neutral wording. Ultimately, after much discussion we decided not to make any

changes, to be congruent with the expectations of our 2019 corporate donors. And you all thought board meetings were boring! Gender-neutral and inclusivity are ideas that are not going away, though. This idea is being discussed at the national level ... but that is a topic for another time and newsletter.

I am also happy to announce the recognition and appreciation elicited by our branch gift of \$20,000 to National AAUW, showing our commitment to the overall mission of AAUW, including our goals in education, training, economic security and leadership of women.




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
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JANUARY

COMMUNITY ACTION GRANTS

Community Action Grants are awarded to local non-profit organizations for activities consistent with AAUW's mission, and are through the AAUW MH's Wildflower Fund. Thirteen applications were received and 10 grants awarded. They are:

- Advent Group Ministries, \$700 for staff training for First Aid Art Groups for Brighter, Trauma-Free Futures, a program in a residential treatment program for 30 teenage girls and transgender youth in Morgan Hill.

- Literary Legacies: \$200 for materials and books for a gender identity writing workshop for boys & girls.
- BookSmart Community Advantage, \$700 for the Gift of Reading, which distributes hundreds of books each year to young readers.
- Learning and Loving Education Center: \$1,000 in support of the "English Now!" program.
- **Community Solutions:** \$800 for "Liberated: Self-Sufficiency for Survivors of Interpersonal Violence," a program that teaches financial literacy and career planning.
- Morgan Hill Peace Project: \$500 toward completion of a monument to build peace, tolerance and friendship.
- **Discovery Counseling Center: \$750** for Bold Quest Mentor and Bold Journey Elementary programs to build communication skills and self-esteem in elementary and high school students.
- Poppy Jasper International Film Festival: \$750 in support of "See It and Be It," a program to encourage high school girls in becoming involved in filmmaking.
- Britton Middle School: \$750 in support of intramural soccer and flag football games to encourage girls to participate in recess and lunchtime "pickup" games.
- PA Walsh School: \$850 toward campus beautification, including painting of the school stage, new stage curtains and a mural near the student drop-off point, to build school pride.







THE TANGLED UKRAINE-RUSSIA-U.S. TRIANGLE: A RECAP


Steve Pifer Nonresident Senior Fellow for Foreign Policy, Brookings Institution, Stanford Research Fellow, and former US Ambassador for Ukraine spoke on November 26, 2019, at the Morgan Hill library. His presentation was extremely knowledgeable and informative. A recap of his talk was prepared by branch member Marilyn Pifer and Steve Pifer.

"When considering the Ukraine-Russia-U.S. triangle, it makes sense to look at each side.

Ukraine-Russia

Ukraine and Russia have historical, cultural, linguistic and religious links that go back to the 10th century AD. From 1654 to 1991, with the exception of a couple of chaotic years after World War I, what is now Ukraine was part of the Russian Empire, then the Soviet Union. When the Soviet Union collapsed in 1991, Ukraine was the hardest part for Russia to lose. Many Russians— including Vladimir Putin— have not yet reconciled themselves to the fact that Ukraine is now an independent state.

MORGAN HILL CHAMBER OF COMMERCE WOMAN OF THE YEAR - CAITLIN JACHIMOWICZ

Congratulations to member Caitlin Robinett Jachimowicz, named the Morgan Hill Woman of the Year exactly 18 years after being Morgan Hill's Student of the year in 2001.



The epithet **Wonder Woman** to describe this accomplished, experienced and inspirational professional and community leader is not hyperbole. She founded Morgan hill's highly successful **Women's Week** in 2017 as a new Morgan Hill City councilwoman, which celebrates women's achievements from all walks of life, students, career women and stay-athome mom alike, and is a forum for engagement and discussion of important issues that women face. A senior managing attorney at her family-owned law firm, she is also a wife and a mother of two young children, a full-time job in itself. Additionally, she is on the board of the Edward Boss Prado non-profit Foundation, a Chamber of Commerce member, and represents state assembly representative Robert Rivas on the Democrat Club central

committee. She is also currently training to be a grief counselor. I can't think of a more deserving woman to be Morgan Hill's Woman of the Year!

LEGAL ADVOCACY FUND (LAF)

In August, an LAF supported case in the U.S. District Court in the District of Minnesota, *Portz v St. Cloud State University*, was decided in favor of a class of female student athletes. In 2016, the athletic department decided to cut six teams from its athletic program, including both the women's tennis and Nordic skiing teams. At the same time, the school also adopted a roster management plan—a way to cap participation on men's teams and pad participation on women's teams—designed to achieve Title IX compliance.



The judge found that the school had violated Title IX and must maintain both women's teams, improve the facilities of women's sports teams to create equity with the men's teams, and take other relevant steps to provide female students with equitable athletic opportunities. The judge stated that the school could implement a cost-savings program that does not result in discrimination against women.

In August, the U.S. District Court in the Eastern District of Virginia sided with transgender student Gavin Grimm, ruling that his former high school's refusal to let him use the bathroom that aligned with his gender identity constituted discrimination under Title IX and violated his rights under the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.
