



To apply for a stipend, first review Convention information in the <u>California Perspective</u>. Select a "package" and decide about hotel reservations. (Sharing a room will reduce that expense.) Once you have determined total cost, submit it, along with a requested stipend amount (maximum of \$200) to <u>Peggy Martin</u>, Leadership Development Chair, **no later** than March 15.

You will be notified before March 20 if you will receive a stipend and how much. The amount will depend on how many members apply, as well as your projected expenses. Reimbursements will be paid immediately after Convention.

## **CONVENTION VOLUNTEER REFUND**

Many volunteers are needed to help during Convention, and volunteering is another way to reduce costs. For five hours of work, you will receive a refund of \$75 of the registration fee. You must sign up ahead of time, including where and when you want to volunteer. The refund will be paid after verification of service. # **Legal Advocacy Fund**

In September 2019, AAUW's Legal Advocacy Fund adopted the case of Freyd v. University of Oregon. Jennifer Freyd has been a Professor in the Psychology Department and is a national leader in the field of trauma psychology. She is the most senior staff member of the Psychology Department based on years in rank. Her salary, however, is substantially less than that of several of her less-senior male colleagues.



In 2016, the University commissioned studies that uncovered gender equity problems with salaries at the full professor level. One study showed that the difference between male and female full professors in psychology is about \$25,000 per year. The reports suggested that the disparity resulted largely from "retention raises" awarded to faculty who pursued outside offers, as an incentive to remain with their current university rather than accepting a better-paid job at a new university.

Freyd filed a lawsuit against the University in the U.S. District Court of the District of Oregon claiming discrimination. The court ruled against her stating that the need to retain professors with outside offers is a sufficient defense to a claim of sex discrimination.

Professor Freyd has filed an appeal to the Ninth Circuit. AAUW will continue to support her through her appeal.
