








Wildflower Fund Allocations

As usual, our allocations include an impressive array of local scholarships, community action grants in support of local non-profit organizations, STEM programs such as Tech Trek camperships for middle school girls, and leadership programs such as the Speech Trek and the Young Women's Leadership Conference. Also, we continue to generously support the national AAUW Fund.

Notable changes from last year include:

- Due to Covid-19 we will not send a woman to Leadership Morgan Hill in 2020-21.
- We will expand our Local Scholarships to include a scholarship for a student graduating from the Morgan Hill Adult School and planning to attend college.
- To give the branch additional funding flexibility and increase our reserve funds given Covid-19 and other unforeseeable factors, the allocation to AAUW national was reduced from last year's record allocation.

Community Action Grants

Applications for Community Action Grants for 2021 are now open on the AAUW Morgan Hill web site under the Philanthropy tab, with a Dec. 15, 2020, deadline. (http://www.aauwmh.org/grants/)

The Allocations Committee has set aside \$7,000 for grants for the coming year. Grants are available for up to \$1,000 to local non-profit organizations requesting funding for a specific program or expense that is in alignment with AAUW's mission. Organizations may submit funding applications for more than one project or application, but separate applications are required for each.

For 2020, \$7,000 in grants were awarded to Community Solutions, the Morgan Hill Peace Project, Literary Legacies, BookSmart Community Advantage, Learning and Loving Education Center, Discovery Counseling Center, Poppy Jasper International Film Festival, Britton Middle School, and P.A. Walsh STEAM Academy

AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund

In August 2020, AAUW adopted the case of Glasson v. Google. Glasson joined Google in 2014. She was repeatedly recognized for her many accomplishments, told her performance was high and was awarded promotions, raises, and bonuses. However, in 2018, she began to notice a pattern of discrimination by her manager against pregnant employees who reported to her. They were not receiving the same recognition and favor as other employees. The manager would make comments such as the employee was "...likely pregnant...again" and that such employees "should leave Google and go to work for a lower-tier company."

Glasson spoke up against this discrimination and reported it to HR. HR recognized the inappropriate behavior but refused to stop it. Glasson's manager took retaliatory action against her, including interviewing other managers to replace her. When Glasson announced that she was pregnant, the harassment against Glasson increased until the stress of the situation forced her to transfer off the team into a management role with another team with reduced responsibility. Google then explicitly stated that she would be given no management responsibilities while she was pregnant as it would stress out her team.

This treatment worsened when Glasson was diagnosed with a life-threatening pregnancy-related condition. This required her to take an earlier maternity leave as she was hospitalized. Glasson made several attempts to reconcile with Google but they refused to acknowledge their wrongdoing. She filed suit in the Superior Court of Washington State, claiming violation of Washington's Law Against Discrimination.

AAUW will support Glasson in her fight against pregnancy discrimination.

Young Women Leaders Update

Diya Kandra is a junior at Sobrato High School and has been active in the Young Women Leaders (YWLs) for four years. As an 8th grader, she was a participant at the leadership conference and joined as a team member in her freshman year of high school.

This year she started a Morgan Hill branch of Silicon Valley Youth Climate Action (SVYCA), and with the other student members created an extremely successful debate for all of the candidates for Morgan Hill City Council. Also with SVYCA, this past summer she did state advocacy for CA Assembly climate-related bills.

With her friend Gelasia Tiwana, Diya was active in the South Bay chapter of the international organization Ma(s)king a Difference. They made 149 homemade masks for community members and frontline workers.

Additional activities include an internship with the Morgan Hill Environmental Dept. where she created a video on composting based on CA state law, Youth Team Leader of Silicon Valley South chapter of Citizens Climate Lobby, and participating in the Sobrato School Environmental Club, WAVE. Also, she is a drum major in the Sobrato School marching band.

Unsurprisingly, Diya envisions an environmental-related career path oriented to policy or science


