# 2021 Wildflower Run/Wildflower Fund Final Report

Again this year, the Covid-19 pandemic necessitated that the Wildflower Run be held virtually, but Run committee members were up to the challenge, creating new ways to reach runners, entice sponsors, and reward participants.

- According to Lori Mains, who handled registration (and packet pick-up) there
  were 335 participants of all ages who ran or walked—locally, nationally, even
  worldwide—including numerous branch members who signed up teams with
  friends and family.
- Run treasurer **Peggy Martin** reports that registration income was \$11,095.
- The Corporate Sponsor team, led by **Barbara Palmer** and **Amy Whelan**, brought in \$20,150. Amy also came up with a new perk for sponsors: the opportunity to create a promotional video for the WFR website.
- Members supported the annual Wildflower Fund Giving Campaign, coordinated by Carol O'Hare, donating total of \$18,299.
- After expenses, net amount available for allocation for all branch philanthropic activities is nearly \$45,000.

As in previous years, many members helped make this event successful, but special thanks go to: **Elizabeth Mandel**, marketing and promotion; **Suman Ganapathy**, prize organization and distribution; **Marian Sacco**, assisting wherever needed; as well as those mentioned above. We're especially grateful for some fresh perspective, such as new member **Wendy Miller's** social media expertise.

## Re-Entry and Deferred Entry Scholarship Recipients

AAUW's Re-Entry and Deferred Entry Scholarships support women who have had to interrupt their educations and who are now ready to begin or continue their college education.

**Adriana Arroyo** is the first recipient of the new Deferred Entry Adult Education Scholarship. Adriana attended Gavilan College in 2011, obtained her GED at the Morgan Hill Community Adult School, and re-entered Gavilan this year to pursue an AS in Nursing. She received a \$1,000 award

**Ginny Hendersen** started college in the early 2000s. She then spent 15 years in nonprofit work while living in China and Thailand, helping women obtain job training and employment. After returning to Morgan Hill she earned an AA Degree in Business Administration from Gavilan College. She will transfer this fall to San Jose State University with a \$1,500 Re-Entry Scholarship in pursuit of a BS in Economics. She wants to work for the State Department, UN, or other international agency focused on economic relief or policy development.

**Maura Hernandez** first attended Gavilan College in 2008, then again in 2015 and 2018. In 2020, she transferred to Northwest University to work towards a BA degree in Psychology. Her career goal of working with youth and their families stems from her community work with churches and nonprofits. She received a \$1,500 Re-Entry Scholarship.

### Fritts Family STEM Scholarship


Susan Fritts established this annual \$1,000 scholarship for undergraduate students majoring in the STEM fields.

Yessenia will attend Howard University in Washington D.C. where she will minor in Chemistry as she studies to become a doctor. Yessenia volunteered at the Wildflower Run for several years when she was at Live Oak High School.

In Devan-Song v. Oregon State University, PhD candidate Anne Devan-Song suffered sexual and gender-based harassment by a fellow graduate student. Oregon State University (OSU) failed to resolve the complaints, but also discharged Devan-Song from her lab despite her excellent academic standing. She was suspended for speaking out about her experiences. Devan-Song filed a lawsuit against Oregon State University for violation of Title IX, The First Amendment, and Oregon law. ### AAUW Morgan Hill & the Morgan Hill Historical Society Partnership celebrate 19 years together

In 2002, our branch formed a partnership with the MH Historical Society that has been a great success for both organizations. Our board agreed that in exchange for providing at least two docents monthly for the Morgan Hill House and the Museum we would be able to hold branch events at the MH House at no charge to our branch.

In the past 19 years, we have had dozens of our members serve as docents, board members and volunteers for countless events at the MHHS. There are currently three branch members serving on the historical society board of directors, as well as a number who previously served as board members. Our committed volunteers continue to make a difference for the MHHS and the BOD is immensely grateful for our hard work and dedication to their mission of preserving and sharing the history of our city.

In honor of the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of women's suffrage, our branch donated two benches that

are prominently displayed on the grounds of Villa Mira Monte.

The Morgan Hill Historical Society celebrates its 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary in September 2021 at Villa Mira Monte. On Saturday, September 11, there will be special events and exhibits on the property, along with tours of the Morgan Hill House and History Museum. The following day, the MHHS documentary film, "History Makers," will have its premiere showing at the MH Community Playhouse.

MHHS was founded in July 1971 to preserve local history at a time when the city was rapidly growing and changing. In 1983 the 1911 Acton farmhouse became the MH History Museum on Main St. (It was moved to its current location at VMM in 2005.) The Villa Mira Monte property was purchased from the City in 1993 and restoration began. Five years later, the Morgan Hill House and VMM property were opened to the public.
