
What is ISPF?

This time of year, many members are writing checks to ISPF AAUW for their Wildflower Fund donations but really don't understand what ISPF is or why we use it.

ISPF AAUW is the Interbranch Special Projects Foundation -AAUW of Santa Clara County. All AAUW branches in the county may have accounts with ISPF; Morgan Hill's is the Wildflower Fund.



Local scholarships and grants, Tech Trek and other branch philanthropic activities, as well as support for AAUW national programs are paid out of this account, as are run-related expenses.

The ISPF board of directors is made up of a representative of each branch that has an account with ISPF. Maggie Leininger is ours. There are also three officers who are appointed by the ISPF board. I currently serve as president; branch member Elena Anderson is secretary; and Virginia Turner of the Los Gatos-Saratoga branch is treasurer.

The Morgan Hill Branch's Community Action Grants committee allocated \$7,000 to nine area nonprofit organizations for projects ranging from books for school children to support for budding filmmakers. This year a special emphasis was placed on grants for schools wrestling with remote-learning challenges.

Grants were made to:

- **Britton Middle School:** two projects, 1) for the purchase of a remote-learning program to encourage online student interactions; and 2) for the purchase of digital drawing tablets to enable math teachers to more effectively communicate with students in the classroom and remotely.
- P.A. Walsh Elementary School: for gift cards to encourage consistent student attendance and participation in remote learning.
- San Martin Gwinn School: to increase the number of Spanish-language books in the school library and to host motivational speaker Lilyan Prado Carrillo for a Zoom assembly.
- Paradise Valley Engineering Academy: to furnish its new library space and build its book collection.
- Literary Legacies and Poppy Jasper International Film Festival: for projects to support a youth writing workshop and film program to enable girls to explore their identities and encourage them to enter filmmaking.
- BookSmart Community Advantage: to buy books for its "Diverse Books for Our Community" program to broaden the range of materials available in school libraries.
- **Discovery Counseling Center:** in support of its "Bold Journey" and "Boldly Me" programs to build self-esteem and mentoring in elementary and middle school students.












Susan Oldham Fritts has established a new scholarship called the Fritts Family STEM Scholarship. The \$1000 scholarship will be awarded to a freshman, sophomore or junior currently working toward a bachelor's degree in science, math, or an engineering program at an accredited four-year college or university.

Branch member Susan and her late husband, David Fritts, were STEM professionals with a shared passion for education and for mentoring women and girls in the fields of science and engineering.

Susan, a retired researcher and chemical engineer, has been involved in Tech Trek, GEMS, the Synopsys Championship, South Valley Science and Engineering Fair, and other local science outreach activities. In addition to helping her with many of these activities, David worked as a failure analysis engineer and was instrumental in training female graduate engineers in the electronics industry. Their commitment to equity in all the STEM fields lives on through the Fritts Family STEM Scholarship.

Equal Pay Day March 24, 2021

Equal Pay Day is the symbolic day dedicated to raising awareness of the gender pay gap. It represents how far into the year the average woman must work in order to earn what the average man earns in the previous year, regardless of experience or job type. Women working full time are paid an average of 82 cents for every dollar paid to a man. Women of color face an even wider pay gap: Black women earn 63 cents for every dollar paid to white men, Latinas earn 55 cents.

AAUW continues to advocate for strong pay equity legislation, regulation, and enforcement.

Legal Advocacy Fund

Paige v. USAID (United States Agency for International Development) involves three women, each of whom worked for USAID for more than 27 years in overseas posts. Each achieved the highest rank in the Senior Foreign Service. In 2016, they discovered that, despite their greater seniority and higher rank, they were paid considerably less than dozens of lower-ranking and less-experienced male Senior Foreign Service officers. The pay disparities in base pay also impacted various aspects of their compensation including danger pay, pay differential for serving in difficult living conditions, contributions to the equivalent of a 401K, and notably, pensions. For pensions, the impact over a 40-year retirement can be as much as \$400,000.

Their complaint was denied by the EEOC (Equal Employment Opportunity Commission) and is now on appeal. The AAUW LAF joined the American Foreign Service Association in supporting this case in August 2020. There is little precedent for cases involving pay inequality in the Senior Foreign Service. Therefore, this is an important case and is being closely watched to determine the commitment of the USAID and the US Government to support pay equality. If successful, it could lead to a review of other senior pay policies.
